Area Partnerships – the local voice of community planning in East Lothian

Area Partnerships strengthen links between communities, area-based services and East Lothian Partnership. They provide an opportunity for local communities to contribute to the *East Lothian Plan* and influence service planning and delivery in their area.

The role of Area Partnerships is to:

- Develop an Area Plan based on a shared vision for the area using evidence from a variety of sources;
- Monitor the delivery of the Area Plans and report to the wider community on impact each year;
- Show creative and active leadership to meet challenges faced by people and communities and maximise opportunities when they arise;
- Assist in determining how resources are allocated in their area according to Area Plan priorities;
- Act as a key point of contact for services to consult and engage with communities on the delivery and improvement of local services; and
- Engage the wider community in identifying issues and solutions for their local area.

This newsletter provides an introduction to East Lothian's six Area Partnerships, outlines their membership and provides a summary of some of the key themes each Partnership is considering as they begin to develop Area Plans.

Between March and June 2014 six Area Partnerships were established across East Lothian:

- Musselburgh Area Partnership
- Preston Seton Gosford Area Partnership
- Fa'side Area Partnership
- Haddington & Lammermuir Area Partnership
- North Berwick Coastal Area Partnership
- Dunbar & East Linton Area Partnership

Each Area Partnership is made up of:

- All East Lothian Council elected members from the ward;
- Representatives from each Community Council in the ward;
- Members from Tenants and Residents Associations;
- Parent Council members representing the interests of children and families;
- Representatives from the Pupil Councils from the local high school

Across East Lothian there are also 20 different active community, voluntary sector and business groups involved in Area Partnerships within their communities.

FA'SIDE AREA PARTNERSHIP

Fa'side, covering Tranent, Ormiston, Pencaitland, Elphinstone and Macmerry, was the first Area Partnership formed in March 2014. After identifying priority themes 4 sub-groups have been set up to identify key actions for the Area Plan.

- **Tranent town centre regeneration** - The aim is to develop a community led regeneration masterplan for Tranent town centre focussed on reducing congestion, improving pedestrian access to and through the town and stimulating economic growth. Funding has been secured to carry out a 'charrette' consultation in spring 2015 to give the community a key role in shaping this plan.

- **Community facilities** - Tranent does not have a Community Centre and the villages that do have centres tend to have limited opening hours and/or dated facilities. This sub group is currently mapping access, availability and use of a wide range of community facilities across the ward to get a clear picture of local needs, before considering opportunities for development.

- **Active transport** - The Partnership identified a variety of challenges to living an active lifestyle in the area and this group is beginning to look at how to improve cycle and walking links, particularly to Ross High and Prestonpans station.

- **Youth Reference Group** - To ensure young people's views are represented a Youth Reference Group has been set up with Recharge. Already this group has identified demand for improved facilities and a skate park in Polson Park as well as safer cycle routes as key issues.

HADDINGTON & LAMMERMUIR AREA PARTNERSHIP

The Haddington & Lammermuir Area Partnership covers East Lothian's largest ward, stretching from Athelstaneford through Haddington, Gifford and over much of the centre and south of the county into the Lammermuir Hills. This Partnership has focussed its attention on thematic areas where it feels it can have an impact including:

- **Access to health services** - The Partnership has been discussing concerns regarding access to health services – particularly in rural areas – pressures faced by GPs in the area, and the forthcoming community hospital.
- **Broadband access** - With the internet becoming more and more essential for modern daily life, the lack of fast and reliable broadband has been identified as a major issue for residents and businesses across the county. Members from this Partnership are working with East Lothian Council staff to develop an aggregated approach to improving broadband access in the rural areas of the county which are unlikely to see significant benefit from the Scottish Government's Next Generation Access scheme.
- **Community facilities and resources** - The Partnership is looking at usage and demand on community facilities in the area - including the Corn Exchange, Town House and village halls - before exploring ways of consolidating this information locally to make it easier to access and encourage wider use.
- **Opportunities for children and young people** - Whilst there appears to be a good range of activities for children and young people in Haddington, there are definite gaps, in particular for rural areas. Youth members from Knox Academy have recently consulted their wider school community about recreational, travel and safety concerns in the area, presenting their findings and recommendations to the Partnership in November.

- **Town centre regeneration** - Re-imagining the role of Prestonpans High Street will be vital in developing a plan for regeneration based on its unique assets.
- **Personal development and resilience** - Exploring initiatives that promote learning, positive mental health and social connection for adults

This ward includes the town of Dunbar, the villages of East Linton, Stenton, Spott, Innerwick and Oldhamstocks and the eastern end of the Lammermuir Hills. As the 6th Partnership set up, meeting for the first time in late June 2014, the Dunbar and East Linton Area Partnership has identified a number of thematic areas which it will be investigating further including:

- **Transport, traffic and parking** – This has been identified as an important local issue with concerns ranging across public transport coverage, cost, reliability and synchronisation, congestion, traffic control and parking in local high streets and improving pedestrian and cycle routes to the town centre, particularly from villages south of the A1.
- **Social isolation** – Seen as a growing problem in the area, particularly for elderly people, many in the Partnership have highlighted of a lack of social and recreational opportunities for older people and difficulties for carers to get the support/respite they need as key issues.
- **Localising services** - With over 1/3 of the ward's population living in villages and rural areas already discussions are moving towards developing creative solutions for sustaining local businesses and promoting community stewardship of local assets.

MUSSELBURGH AREA PARTNERSHIP

The Musselburgh Area Partnership, formed in March 2014, covers both Musselburgh wards including Wallyford, Whitecraig and Carberry. Over the last 10 months the Partnership has identified a number of themes to focus on that have potential to make a real difference in the area. These include:

- **Attendance and achievement for children and young people** - In a bid to tackle the trend of falling attendance across area schools the Partnership is developing a community-wide *Attendance Matters* campaign. This will kick-start an ongoing project designed to foster a culture of aspiration and achievement across the whole community.
- **Investment and opportunity** - The Partnership is keen to support community led regeneration initiatives in the area, e.g. at the Town Hall and Fisherrow Harbour. It also has a role in monitoring the delivery of the Musselburgh Town Centre Strategy, creating more reasons for visitors and local people to 'stop and stay' and enjoy Musselburgh, revitalising the town centre economy.
- **Health inequalities** – There are significant health inequalities within the Musselburgh area– particularly in relation to life-style dependent illnesses and children's health. To help members develop a better understanding of this issue the Partnership will be hosting a workshop looking at the relationship between health outcomes and social determinants of health in order to identify effective local interventions.

The North Berwick Coastal ward lies to the north-east of the county and stretches from Aberlady to North Berwick. Meeting since May 2014 the Partnership has identified key themes for investigation across their ward and is currently looking at developing actions for the Area Plan around issues including:

- **Travel and transport** - Whilst reliable and affordable public transport was the main issue raised, there is significant interest in establishing high quality active transport routes in the area. There may also be

an opportunity to work across rural Area Partnerships to develop an East Lothian wide approach to community transport provision.

- **Young people and cyber bullying** – Identified as a key issue by the North Berwick High Pupil Council work is underway to consult pupils about the prevalence of cyber bullying in the area and their awareness of the tools available to tackle it. These results will help inform plans for a community wide awareness raising campaign.
- **Increasing older population** – Here, rather than concentrating solely on forecast increases in demand for health and care services, the Partnership is also focussing on initiatives to reduce isolation and sustain community involvement– e.g. Dementia Friendly Towns.
- **Green space and the environment** – The quality of the natural environment is a key reason people choose to live in this ward. Protecting, maintaining and enhancing this will be central to a vision for the future of the area.
